Planning a sabbatical to the Harvard Graduate School of Education



The Process:

This report was written after many discussions with Principals who were thinking of attending a course at the Harvard Graduate School of Education and were unsure of the process, costs and value of the course.

My sabbatical journey began in 2017 when I was looking through the Harvard Graduate School of Education for possible courses that I could attend. I noticed that the Turnaround Schools Leadership course was offered in June that year. This course focused on creating a postive culture and implementing a strategy for school improvement. The course was held in June, and that worked well for the timing of my sabbatical. The following is the time line for organising my sabbatical to Harvard:




*New Zealand passport holders need to apply for an ESTA for entry into the USA. When you go through to apply for your ESTA online – make sure you don't google this (this will take you to a third party site which, while it is still OK, does mean you end up paying a lot more than the US\$14:00 fee

Once completed it will end with a confirmation. Your ESTA will be valid for 2 years from application date and offers multiple entry into the USA. I recommend you print off a copy of your confirmation and include this with your travel documents. You can leave applying for your ESTA until closer to your departure date, but I don't recommend leaving this any later than 3 months prior to your departure.

The course:

I chose "School Turnaround Leaders" as I was interested in culture and strategy rather than turnaround schools. This looked at what was more important, culture or strategy, how do you evaluate and change culture, and how to shift a strategic plan to a clear strategy.

The course was run at the start of June. The weather is fantastic then, but you do need to know that this is just after the end of the United States school year so if you intend to visit schools you may have to go earlier rather than later as they will be closed. Actually, not a great time for school visits.

The following were the specific topics of the course:

- Framing and reframing organisations in education
- Strategy in action
- The turnaround leader
- Shaping school culture
- School turnaround and instructional improvement
- Leading educators in using data wisely

- Cultural leadership
- Leading teams
- Socio-emotional learning
- Strategic engagement of families and communities
- Diversifying the human capital pipeline
- Human capital in action

The programme:

Each day starts with breakfast from 7.30-8.00am. Days generally start at 8am and finish at 7.30pm. There were two social events; a reception at a bar and a BBQ. I think it is important to note that it is expected that you attend both of these sessions and it is also stated that partners are not welcome (that's me being blunt not them).

The lectures are run as an interactive session and include:

- Open mike questions and answers
- Sharing with the person next to you
- Sharing with a small group in your vicinity
- Small work groups


There is also a discussion group that meets each day (about 10 people with a post graduate student) and a consultancy group (about 4-5 people sharing an issue). You do need to be prepared to be invloved. I was personally sad that I did not attend with others from our school as most people there were with larger groups from their schools.

Lunch each day is on your own and it is a two minute walk into Harvard Square where there are a number of restaurants.

Accommodation:

Most people choose accommodation close to the School of Education building in Harvard Square. I personally chose accommodation away from the square as it was substantially cheaper and a lovely hotel. This was in Porter Square and required a 20 minute walk (there is a bus) straight down the road the hotel was on, and was safe both in the morning and late at night. I found it a relaxing start to the day, however this was at the start of summer and a lovely 20-25 degrees. Across the road from the hotel were a number of restaurants, a supermarket and a fantastic bookstore/coffee shop. I booked my hotel on-line and only paid \$215US/\$325NZ a night (see attached accomodation guide).

The following is a cost table for the week long course at the Harvard Graduate School of Education. I personally arrived the Sunday before the course started and then left the Sunday after (one full week) to give me a day exploring the Freedom Trail in Boston. This was a great walk - you follow a brick inlay in the sidewalk and it takes about 2½ hours, starting at the oldest park in the USA (Boston Commons) and ending at Bunker Hill over the river. You walk through little Italy so make sure you buy a slice of pizza!

Evaluation:

This was a fantastic course. Whilst the days were long, they were broken up well and the teaching and learning was based on a strong pedagogy of pair/share, individual answers, group work and more in depth discussion and consultancy groups. It was a pleasure to be invloved in professional development that modelled strong pedagogy rather than simply talk about it via a powerpoint presentation.

There were aspects of the course that were not relevant. This included strategies for increasing the pipeline for Latino and Black teachers, and areas where they were further behind than us such as engaging in communities and whanau. The areas of culture and strategy were the best presentations I have been too, and the consultancy group where you shared a problem and worked on a solution placed me outside my comfort zone (especially when they talk about you and your problem in a room while you sit in the room facing the corner), but it was incredibly deep and worthwhile.

I was the only person from New Zealand. There were five Australians (although they called themselves Tasmanians) and a large group from Botswana. The rest of the 180-200 people generally were made of leadership teams, school inspectors and educationalists. Most people attended as a team, and being an individual meant at times that you had to join groups to complete some of the tasks.

I have already begun planning for next year with respect to how the Board will implement a change in strategic plan, and the strategies to implement that plan. As a staff we have begun evaluating our school culture to review how our artifacts and norms of behaviour support (or not) our school values and beliefs. This will be an interesting journey.

The two pieces of information that I took away which matter most to me would be:

- 1. Culture eats strategy for lunch...and now I have the tools to evaluate our culture and to implement our strategy.
- 2. Your strategy must be focused on the instructional core (the teaching and learning). Too often we focus on strategies that support the core (eg. well-being) and forget to place teaching and learning at the heart of what we do. *Teaching matters*.
